

The Giant Barred Frog is an endangered frog species that lives in moist forests around northern New South Wales and southern Queensland. It eats insects, worms and other frogs, and is about 11 cm long when fully grown. When the Giant Barred Frog lays its eggs, it flicks them up out of the water onto the stream bank, helping to protect the eggs from fish and other animals that might eat them. Rains then wash the tadpoles down into the water so that they can grow.

The photos below are of the Giant Barred Frog in the different phases of its life cycle. Can you put them in the correct order? Which stages are missing? Draw these stages yourself.
